Data in this publication are only reflective of those businesses reported on as operating in the town at the time of data collection (see Table 30 for list of businesses reported on).

To comply with privacy legislation or where appropriate, some data in this publication may have been adjusted and will not reflect the actual data reported by businesses. As a result of this, combined with certain data not being reported by some businesses, some components may not add to totals and changes over time may be partially reflective of business' change in propensity to report on certain data items rather than actual changes over time. Total figures have generally not been adjusted.

Caution is advised when interpreting the comparisons made to the earlier 2011 publication as the businesses identified and reported on and the corresponding jobs may differ between publications.

Notes for each table and chart are alphabetically ordered and listed at the end of the publication.

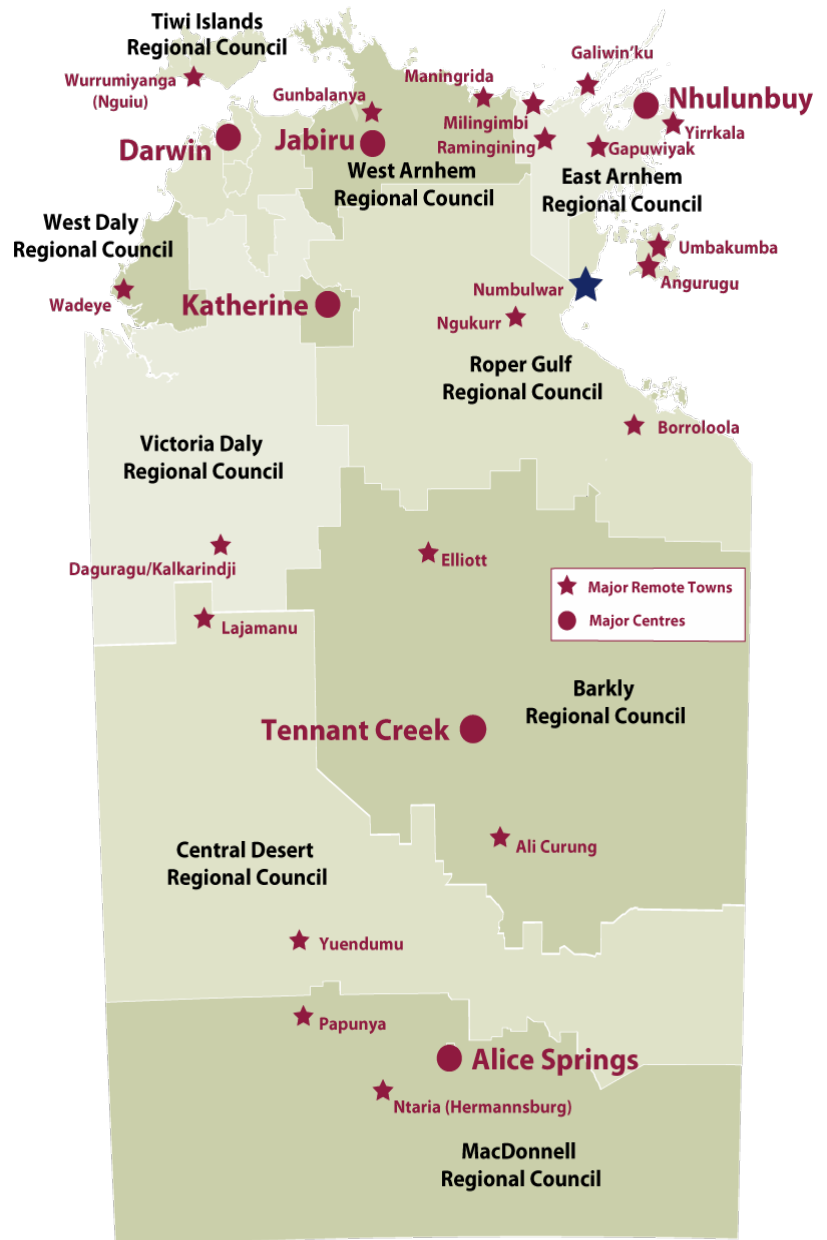
Numbulwar

Numbulwar is located approximately 400 kilometres east of Katherine, 570 kilometres south-east of Darwin and 250 kilometres south-west of Nhulunbuy. Numbulwar resides at the mouth of the Rose River on the western coast of the Gulf of Carpentaria, adjacent to the extreme south-west coast of Groote Eylandt.

The Northern Territory Government is working with Territorians, the Australian Government, regional councils, land councils, private businesses, Aboriginal organisations, not-for-profit organisations and industry groups to improve the standard of living in remote Territory communities.

This publication provides a snapshot of jobs and the characteristics of job holders in Numbulwar as at June-July 2014. It contains information collected by the Northern Territory Department of Business from businesses operating within the town and is supplemented by other administrative data sets and information. This 2014 publication also compares and comments on variations that are evidenced between the 2014 and earlier 2011 collection periods.

The information collected and reported on represents a significant goodwill investment by those businesses that participated. Each business is listed at the end of this publication.



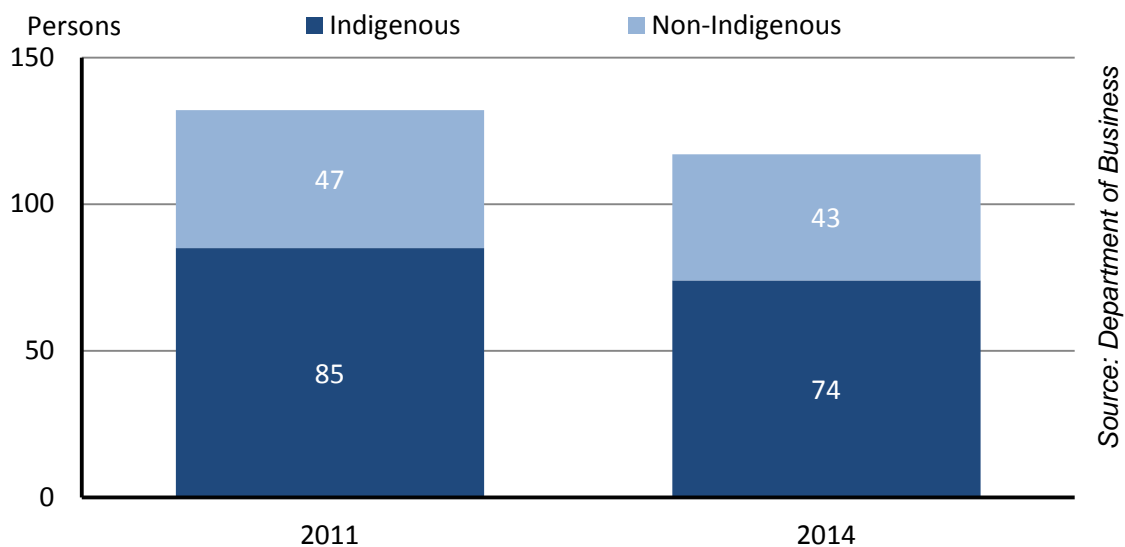
Publication Summary

At the time of collection in 2014 in Numbulwar there were a total of 127 filled and vacant jobs, a decrease of 15 jobs overall from 2011. Filled jobs decreased by 15 to 117 jobs.

Of the 117 filled jobs there were:

- 74 jobs held by Indigenous persons, a decrease of 11 jobs from 2011, and 43 jobs were held by non-Indigenous persons, a decrease of 4 jobs from 2011

Summary Chart 1: Count of filled jobs in Numbulwar by Indigenous status, 2011 and 2014



- 90 jobs in the public sector, an increase of 2 jobs from 2011, and 27 jobs in the private sector, a decrease of 17 jobs over the same period
- 95 permanent jobs, an increase of 3 jobs from 2011, and 22 temporary jobs, a decrease of 18 jobs from 2011
- 53 jobs filled by males, a decrease of 12 jobs from 2011, and 64 jobs filled by females, a decrease of 3 jobs over the same period
- 6 jobs filled by persons aged 15-24 years, an increase of 2 jobs from 2011, 63 jobs filled by persons aged 25-44 years, a decrease of 7 jobs from 2011, and 48 jobs filled by persons aged 45+ years, a decrease of 10 jobs from 2011
- 38 jobs as Community and personal service workers, making it the largest occupation group in terms of filled jobs
 - other significant occupation groups were:
 - ◆ Professionals with 26 filled jobs
 - ◆ Clerical and administrative workers with 13 filled jobs
- there were 10 vacancies, unchanged from 2011.

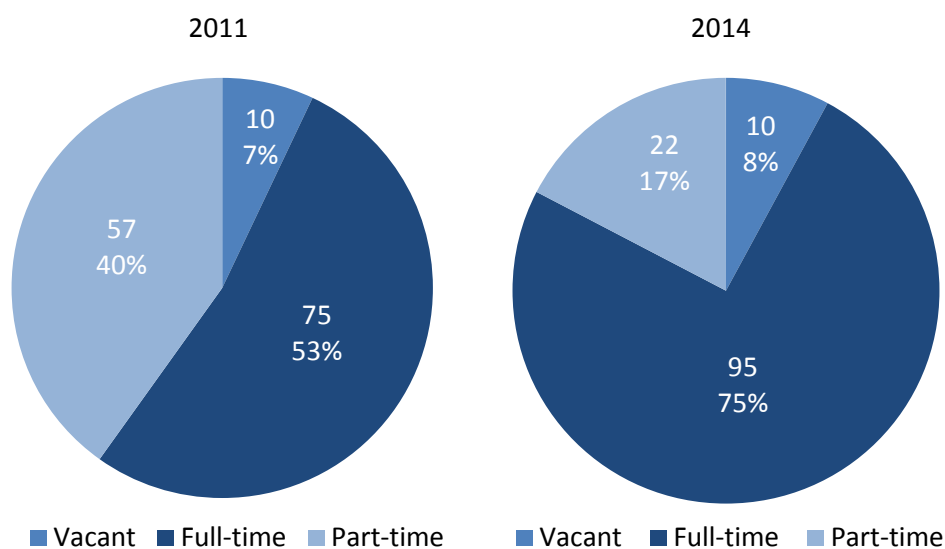

Chart 1: Count of vacant jobs and filled jobs by full-time/part-time status, 2011 and 2014 (a)(b)



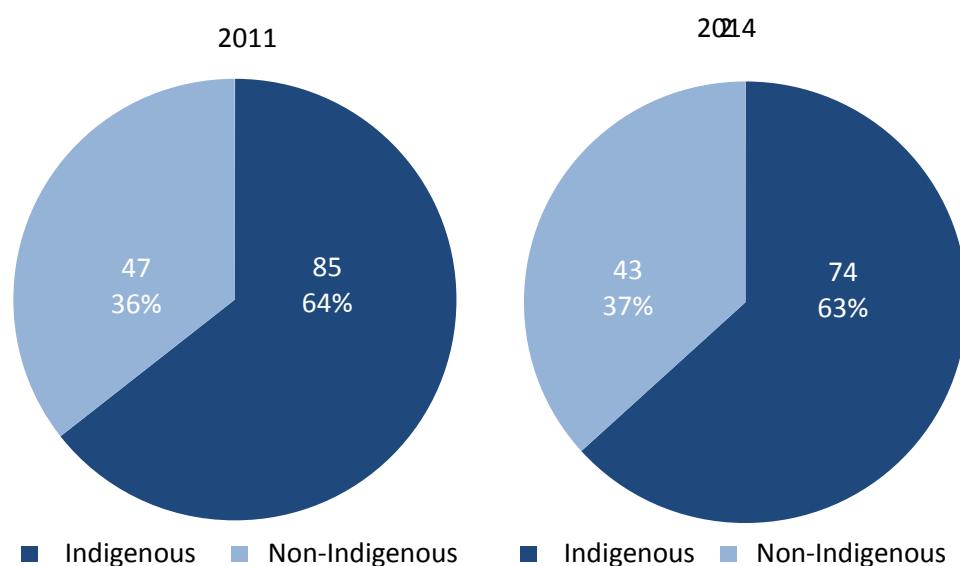

- there were a total of 117 filled jobs, a decrease of 15 jobs from 2011
- of the 117 filled jobs in 2014:
 - 95 were full-time jobs, an increase of 20 jobs from 2011
 - 22 were part-time jobs, a decrease of 35 jobs from 2011

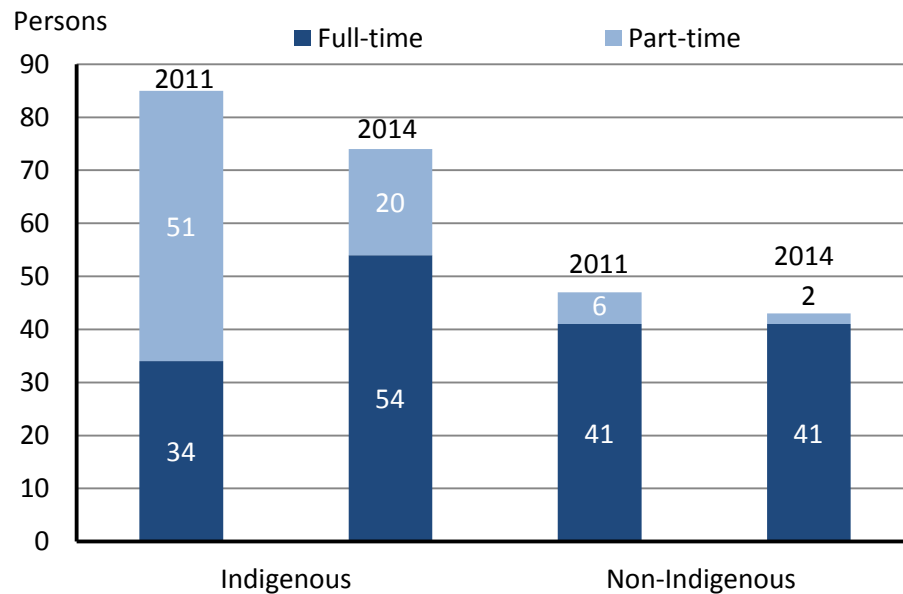

 - 2 were part-time jobs filled by non-Indigenous persons, a decrease of 4 jobs from 2011.

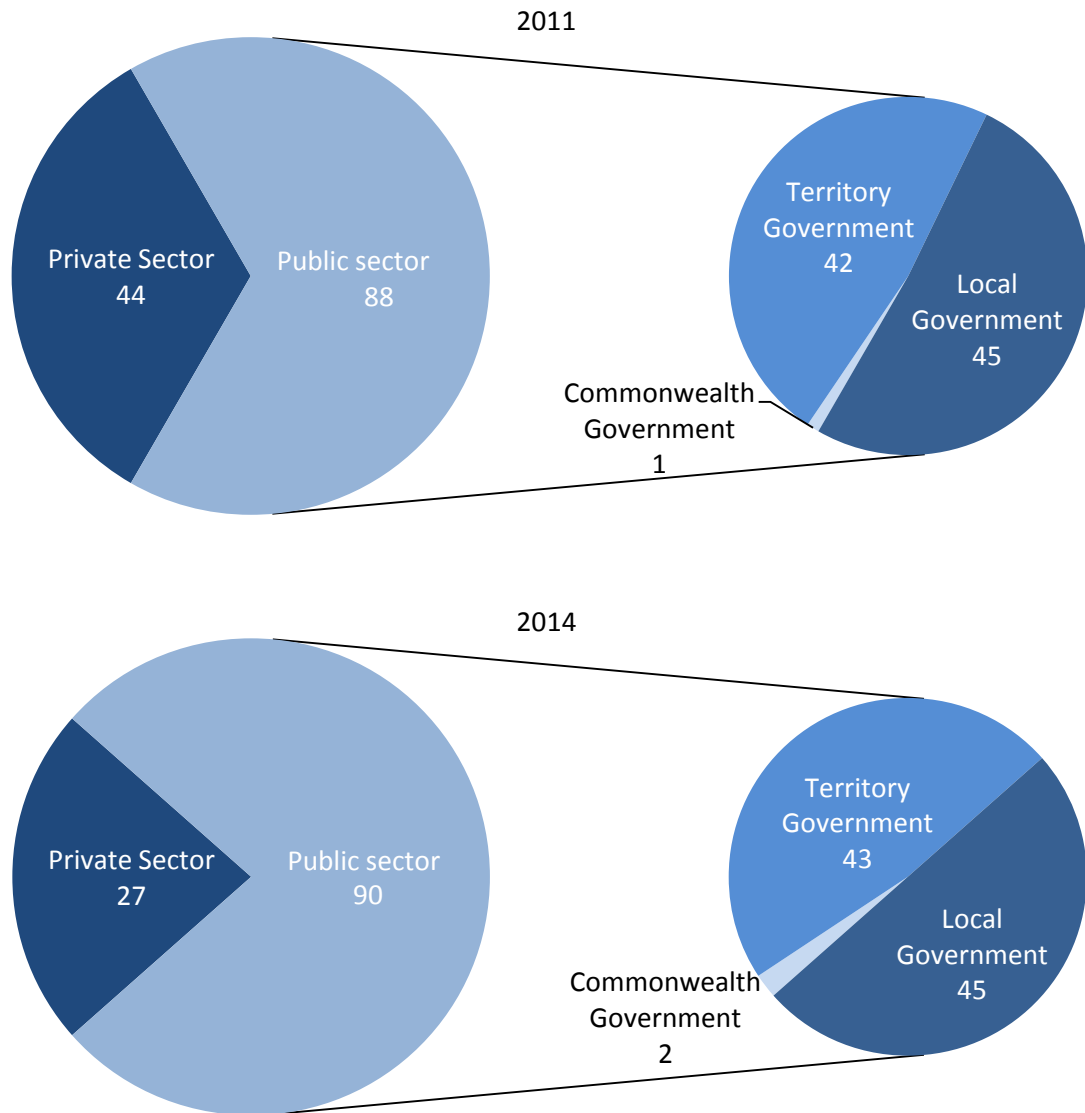

 - 43 jobs were in the Territory Government, an increase of 1 job from 2011

Chart 5: Count of filled jobs by sector and Indigenous status of person in job, 2011 and 2014 (a)(c)(d)

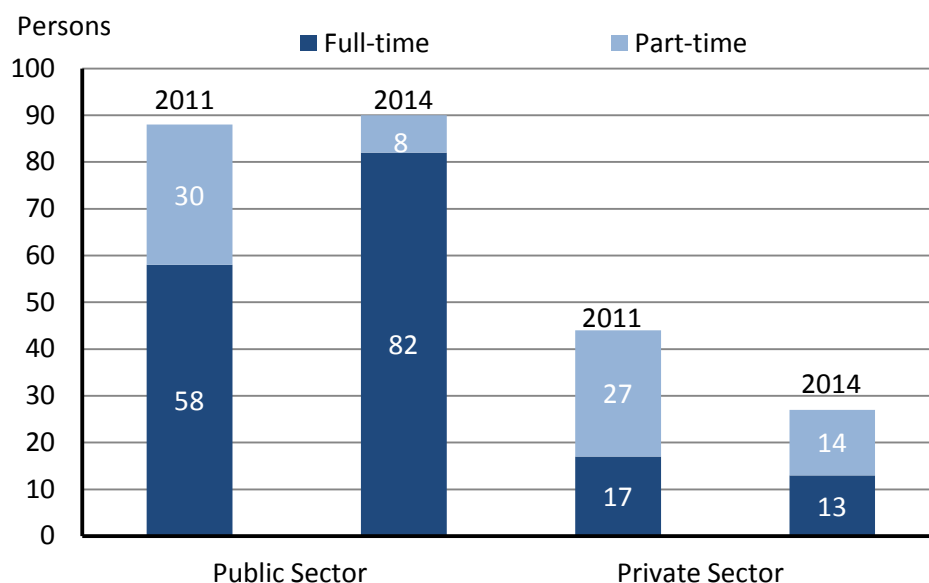

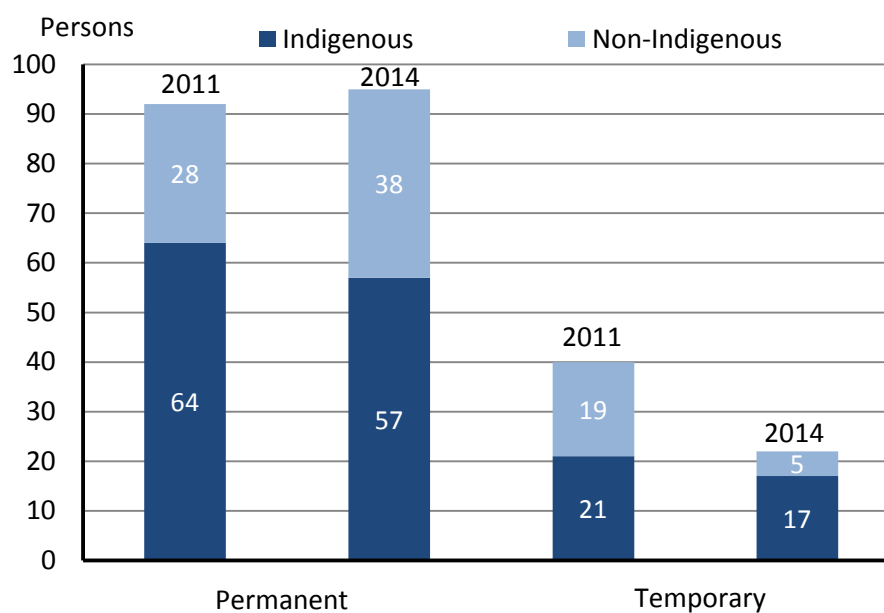

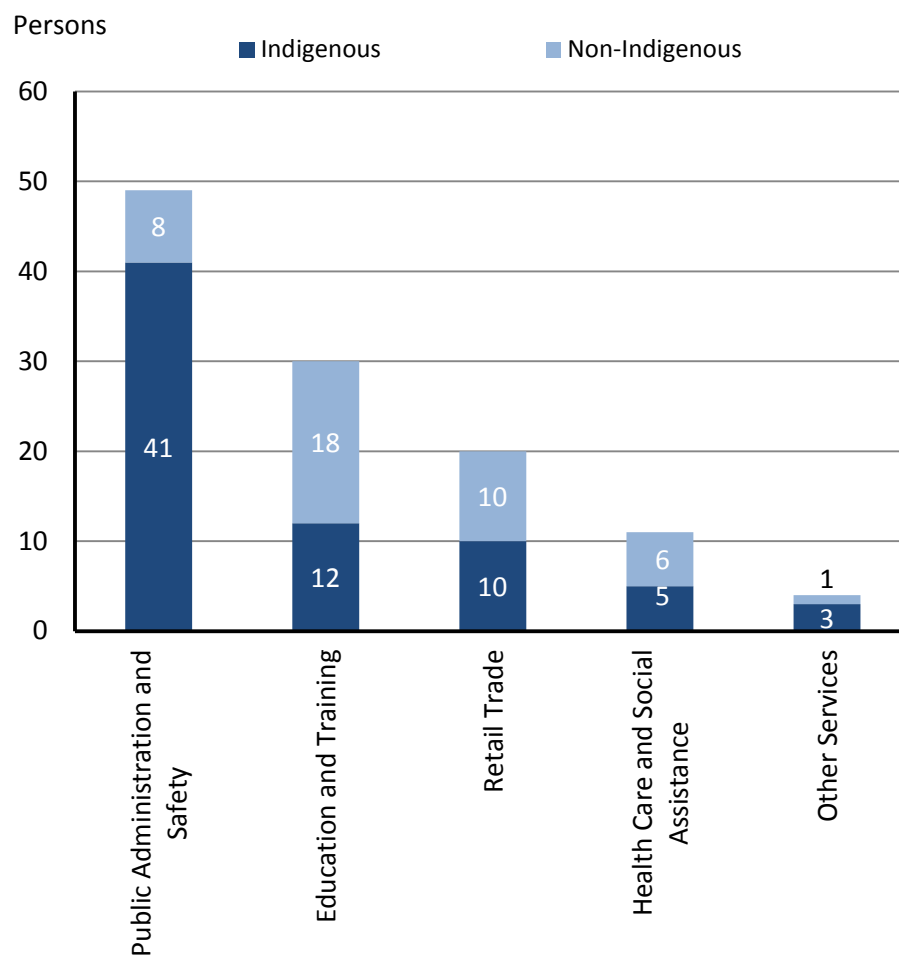
- the Public administration and safety industry was the largest industry employer, with 49 filled jobs or 41.9% of filled jobs, an increase of 1 job from 2011

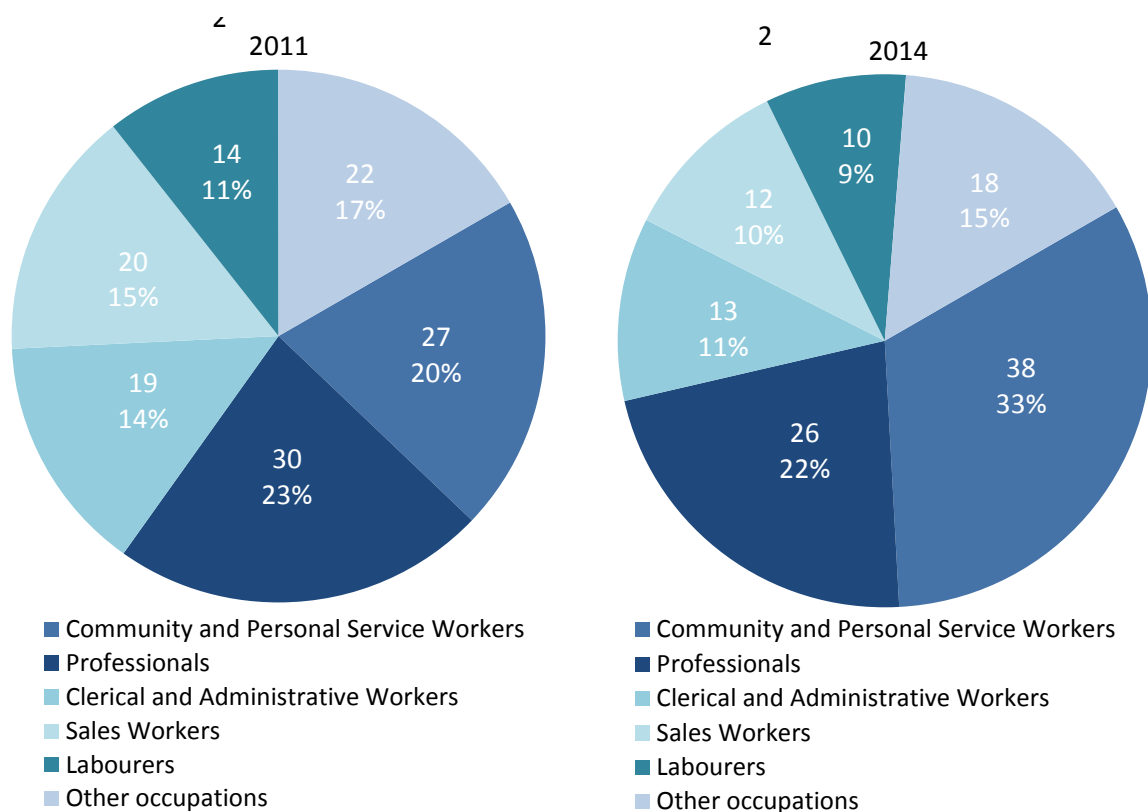

In 2014 in Numbulwar:

- Community and personal service workers was the largest occupation classification in terms of filled jobs, accounting for 38 jobs (32.5% of total filled jobs), an increase of 11 jobs from 2011
- other significant occupation classifications were:
 - Professionals (26 jobs or 22.2%) a decrease of 4 jobs from 2011
 - Clerical and administrative workers (13 jobs or 11.1%) a decrease of 6 jobs from 2011
 - Sales workers (12 jobs or 10.3%) a decrease of 8 jobs from 2011.

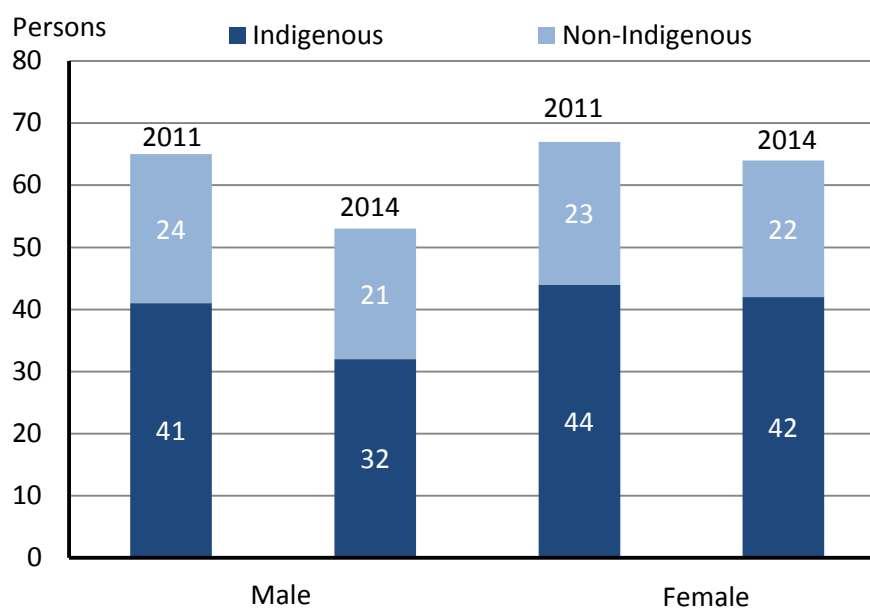

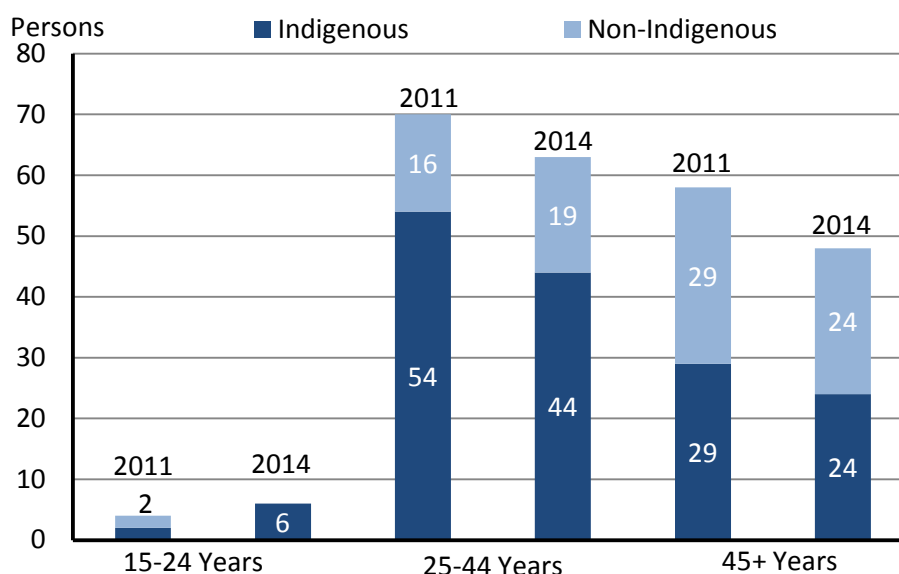

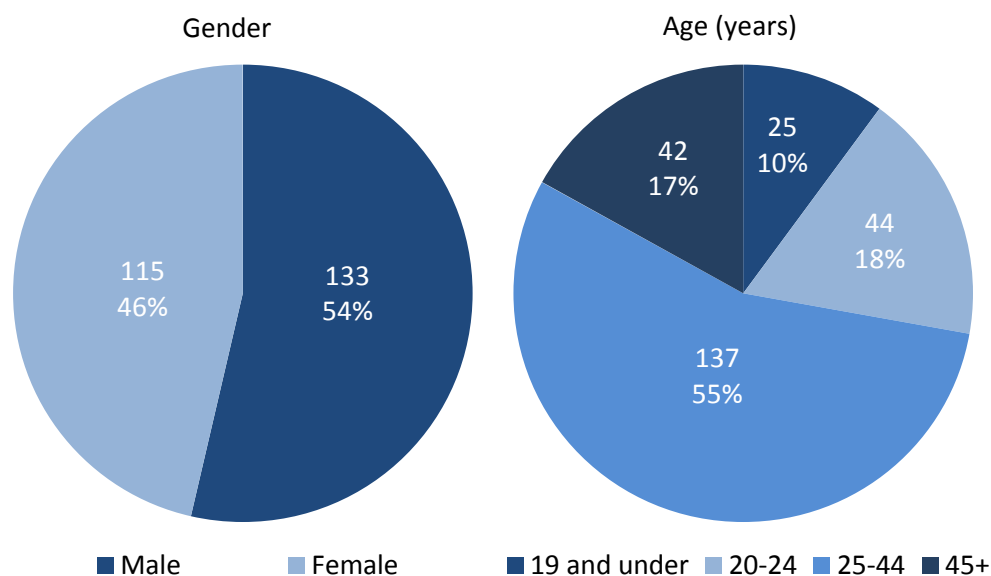
