

African swine fever



Hunting? Help save our bacon.

You are our eyes and ears in the field and good hunting practices will keep Australia free from ASF.

African swine fever (ASF) is a contagious viral disease of pigs that's spreading rapidly and will devastate our pork industry if it gets in. Hunting restrictions could be introduced and entire wild boar populations could be wiped out.

ASF is not a danger to human health, food safety or dog health.

The disease is spread by direct contact with infected pigs, contaminated vehicles, equipment or clothing and by feeding infected swill or meat scraps to pigs.

Do

- ✓ Clean and disinfect all equipment on site.
- ✓ Clean and bag all carcasses before leaving the hunting area.
- ✓ If it looks suss call us. Report any signs of sick or dead pigs to the **Emergency Animal Disease hotline on 1800 675 888**.
- ✓ Respect all biosecurity restrictions that are in place.

Don't

- ✓ Move live animals (including piglets) to new locations without completing a Northern Territory Waybill. Go to: nt.gov.au/waybills
- X Leave leftovers from your meals in the hunting area.
- X Hunt wild pigs if you are in contact with domestic pigs.
- X Travel with uncovered or unbagged carcasses in the back of a ute.
