Disclaimer

The data in this publication was collected by conducting a survey of businesses located in the 28 remote town boundaries. This body of work was completed in 2023 by the former Northern Territory Department of Industry, Tourism and Trade.

The collection methodology was created in accordance with Australian Bureau of Statistics data quality framework principles. Data in this publication is only reflective of those businesses reported on as operating in the town at the time of data collection (see table at the end of publication for list of businesses reported on). To comply with privacy legislation or where appropriate, some data in this publication may have been adjusted and will not reflect the actual data reported by businesses. As a result of this, combined with certain data not being reported by some businesses, some components may not add to totals. Changes over time may also reflect change in business propensity to report on certain data items rather than actual changes over time. Total figures have generally not been adjusted. Caution is advised when interpreting the comparisons made to the earlier 2011, 2014 and 2017 publications as the businesses identified and reported on and the corresponding jobs may differ between publications. The surveys have not always gathered data on training and jobs in the same years.

Notes for each table and chart are ordered alphabetically and listed at the end of the publication.

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

REMOTE TOWNS JOBS PROFILE WURRUMIYANGA (NGUIU)

Introduction

This jobs profile provides a snapshot of jobs and the characteristics of job holders in Wurrumiyanga (Nguiu) as of September 2023. Trends from the surveys conducted in 2011, 2014, and 2017 are also described. Additionally, it presents data on Community Development Program activity, Population, and Vocational Education and Training.

This job profile is one of 28 profiles developed for remote towns in the Northern Territory. It is anticipated these, and subsequent profiles will contribute to a robust evidence base to inform decision making in and relating to these remote Territory towns.

This profile contains information collected by the Northern Territory Department of Industry, Tourism and Trade from businesses operating within the town and is supplemented by other administrative data sets and information.

Each profile provides up-to-date information that is intended to inform the planning and design of current and future government programs and as an evidence base to inform decision making relating to workforce development, enterprise and job opportunities.

The profile may best be understood as a point-in-time tool. The number of business surveys from which the data was drawn is significantly less than in earlier surveys, and business participation has decreased with each survey. For Wurrumiyanga (Nguiu), 45% fewer businesses than in 2017 are reported here.

The data collection methodology and corresponding questionnaire were created in partnership with the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) and in accordance with ABS data quality framework and survey principles.

The Northern Territory Department of Industry, Tourism and Trades' Territory Engagement and Delivery, Skills Initiative and VET data teams collaborated with the Northern Institute at Charles Darwin University to facilitate the surveys and reports.

The information collected and reported on represents a significant goodwill investment by those businesses and organisations that participated. Each business is listed at the end of this publication.

Summary

The 2023 jobs profile was developed based on responses from 12 businesses operating within the Wurrumiyanga (Nguiu) town boundary, 10 less than in the 2017 survey. Of these, there were:

- 8 businesses from the Private Sector, accounting for 122 filled jobs or 77% of total filled jobs
- 4 businesses from the Public Sector, accounting for 36 filled jobs or 23% of total filled jobs
- 8 businesses participated in all four surveys (completed in 2011, 2014, 2017 and 2023).

A total of 174 filled and vacant jobs in Wurrumiyanga (Nguiu) were reported, a decrease of 321 jobs from 2017.¹

The 2023 profile highlights:

- there were 158 filled jobs of which:
 - o 107 jobs (68%) were filled by Aboriginal people, a decrease of 208 jobs from 2017
 - 51 jobs (32%) were filled by non-Aboriginal people, a decrease of 95 jobs from 2017
 - 58% of employed Aboriginal people are working in the Private Sector
 - Aboriginal people accounted for 68% of job holders in the town, unchanged from 2017
 - $\circ~$ Aboriginal females made up 72% of total Aboriginal filled jobs in the town, compared to 55% in 2017
- there were 16 vacant jobs, of which:
 - $_{\odot}$ job vacancies as a percentage of jobs increased to 9.2% in 2023 from 6.9% in 2017
 - \circ job vacancies equate to 1 in 10.8 jobs
 - 12 of the vacancies were in Community and Personal Service Works and Clerical and Administrative areas
- Education and Training was the largest industry employer in 2023
- Public Administration and Safety had the highest decrease in filled jobs of 82 between 2023 and 2017
- training had a decrease in student numbers between 2023 and 2016
- Community Services, Health and Education had the highest student numbers in 2023
- Building and Construction has the highest increase in student numbers between 2023 and 2016
- in 2023 Tourism and Hospitality was conducted for 11 students, a training area not delivered in 2013 and 2016.

The overall population in Wurrumiyanga (Nguiu) decreased by 110 people (-7.2%) between 2011 and 2021 to 1,417 people.

In comparison, the overall Northern Territory population increased by 9.7% between 2011 and 2021.

In 2021, the working age population (15 years and over) in Wurrumiyanga (Nguiu) was an estimated 1,117 people compared to 1,103 in 2011 an increase of 1.3%.

There were 0.2 jobs in Wurrumiyanga (Nguiu) per working age person compared to 0.3 jobs per working age person across the 28 remote towns in the NT.






In 2023 in Wurrumiyanga (Nguiu):

- there was a total of 158 filled jobs, a decrease of 303 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 232 jobs from 2014
- of the 158 filled jobs in 2023:
 - $\circ~~67$ were full-time jobs, a decrease of 182 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 179 jobs from 2014
 - 91 were part-time jobs, a decrease of 121 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 53 jobs from 2014
- there were 16 total job vacancies in 2023, a decrease of 18 vacancies from 2017 and a decrease of 1 vacancy from 2014.

- of the 158 filled jobs:
 - **Aboriginal** people filled 107 jobs, a decrease of 208 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 163 jobs from 2014
 - non-Aboriginal people filled 51 jobs, a decrease of 95 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 69 jobs from 2014
- **Aboriginal** people accounted for 68% of job holders, unchanged from 2017 and 69% in 2014.




Chart 3: Count of filled jobs by full-time/part-time status, 2011, 2014, 2017 & 2023 (a)(b)(c)

 - 30 were full-time jobs filled by Aboriginal people, a decrease of 85 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 106 jobs from 2014
 - 77 were part-time jobs filled by Aboriginal people, a decrease of 123 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 57 jobs from 2014
 - 37 were **full-time** jobs filled by **non-Aboriginal** people, a decrease of 97 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 73 jobs from 2014
 - 14 were **part-time** jobs filled by **non-Aboriginal** people, an increase of 2 jobs from 2017 and an increase of 4 jobs from 2014.





Chart 4: Count of filled jobs by business sector, 2011, 2014, 2017 & 2023 (a)(d)

- there were 36 jobs in the Public Sector, a decrease of 93 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 83 jobs from 2014
- of the 36 jobs in the **Public Sector**:
 - 1 job was in the Australian Government, a decrease of 5 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 5 jobs from 2014
 - 35 jobs were in the Territory Government, a decrease of 7 jobs from 2017 and an increase of 3 jobs from 2014
- there were 122 jobs in the Private Sector, a decrease of 210 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 149 jobs from 2014.




Chart 6: Count of filled jobs by sector 2011, 2014, 2017 & 2023 (a)(c)(d)

 - non-Aboriginal people filled 20 jobs, a decrease of 23 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 16 jobs from 2014
- of the 122 jobs in the **Private Sector**:
 - **Aboriginal** people filled 91 jobs, a decrease of 138 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 96 jobs from 2014
 - non-Aboriginal people filled 31 jobs, a decrease of 72 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 53 jobs from 2014.




Chart 7: Count of filled jobs by sector and full-time/part-time status, 2011, 2014, 2017 & 2023 (a)(b)(d)

 - 26 were full-time jobs, a decrease of 79 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 70 jobs from 2014
 - 10 were part-time jobs, a decrease of 14 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 13 jobs from 2014
- of the 122 jobs in the **Private Sector**:
 - 41 were full-time jobs, a decrease of 103 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 109 jobs from 2014
 - 81 were **part-time** jobs, a decrease of 107 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 40 jobs from 2014.

- 16 jobs in the **Public Sector** filled by **Aboriginal** people, a decrease of 70 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 67 jobs from 2014, of which:
 - 6 were full-time jobs, a decrease of 57 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 54 jobs from 2014
 - 10 were part-time jobs, a decrease of 13 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 13 jobs from 2014
- 91 jobs in the Private Sector filled by Aboriginal people, a decrease of 138 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 96 jobs from 2014, of which:
 - 24 were full-time jobs, a decrease of 28 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 52 jobs from 2014
 - 67 were part-time jobs, a decrease of 110 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 44 jobs from 2014
- 20 jobs in the Public Sector filled by non-Aboriginal people, a decrease of 23 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 16 jobs from 2014, of which:
 - 20 were full-time jobs, a decrease of 22 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 16 jobs from 2014





Chart 8: Count of filled jobs by employment status, 2011, 2014, 2017 & 2023 (a)(c)(e)



- there were 40 permanent jobs, a decrease of 147 jobs from 2017, and a decrease of 178 jobs from 2014, of which:
 - **Aboriginal** people filled 25 jobs, a decrease of 107 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 119 jobs from 2014
 - non-Aboriginal people filled 15 jobs, a decrease of 40 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 59 jobs from 2014
- there were 118 temporary jobs, a decrease of 156 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 54 jobs from 2014, of which:
 - **Aboriginal** people filled 82 jobs, a decrease of 101 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 44 jobs from 2014
 - **non-Aboriginal** people filled 36 jobs, a decrease of 55 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 10 jobs from 2014.

 - 13 jobs were **permanent**, a decrease of 79 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 100 jobs from 2014, of which:
 - **Aboriginal** people filled 4 jobs, a decrease of 63 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 76 jobs from 2014
 - non-Aboriginal people filled 9 jobs, a decrease of 16 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 24 jobs from 2014
 - 23 jobs were **temporary**, a decrease of 14 jobs from 2017 and an increase of 17 jobs from 2014, of which:
 - Aboriginal people filled 12 jobs, a decrease of 7 jobs from 2017 and an increase of 9 jobs from 2014
 - non-Aboriginal people filled 11 jobs, a decrease of 7 jobs from 2017 and an increase of 8 jobs from 2014

 - Aboriginal people filled 21 jobs, a decrease of 44 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 43 jobs from 2014
 - non-Aboriginal people filled 6 jobs, a decrease of 24 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 35 jobs from 2014
 - 95 jobs were **temporary**, a decrease of 142 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 71 jobs from 2014, of which:
 - **Aboriginal** people filled 70 jobs, a decrease of 94 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 53 jobs from 2014
 - **non-Aboriginal** people filled 25 jobs, a decrease of 48 jobs from 2017 and a decrease of 18 jobs from 2014.

REMOTE TOWNS JOBS PROFILE WURRUMIYANGA (NGUIU)

- there were 16 vacancies reported, a decrease of 18 vacancies from 2017 and a decrease of 1 vacancy from 2014
- of the 16 reported vacancies, the largest requirements were for:
 - 8 Community and Personal Service Workers, the majority of which are in the following jobs:
 - Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Worker
 - Police Officer
 - Welfare Support Worker
 - 4 Clerical and Administrative Workers in the following jobs:
 - General Clerk
 - Medical Administrator
 - Program or Project Administrator
 - 2 Professionals, the majority of which are in the following jobs:




Chart 9: Count of filled jobs by top 5 industries of business, 2023 (a)(c)(h)




Chart 10: Percentage and count of top 6 filled jobs by occupation, 2011, 2014, 2017 & 2023 (a)(f)(g)




Chart 11: Count of filled jobs by gender, 2011, 2014, 2017 & 2023 (a)(c)(i)




Chart 12: Count of filled jobs by age, 2011, 2014, 2017 & 2023 (a)(c)(j)





In 2021 in Wurrumiyanga (Nguiu):

- there were an estimated 1,417 people, of which:
 - o 682 (48.1%) were male
 - o 735 (51.9%) were female




