As a result of this, combined with certain data not being reported by some businesses, some components may not add to totals and changes over time may be partially reflective of business' change in propensity to report on certain data items rather than actual changes over time. Total figures have generally not been adjusted.

Caution is advised when interpreting the comparisons made to the earlier 2011 publication as the businesses identified and reported on and the corresponding jobs may differ between publications.


Wadeye

Wadeye (also known as Port Keats) is located 420 kilometres south-west of Darwin.

The Northern Territory Government is working with Territorians, the Australian Government, regional councils, land councils, private businesses, Aboriginal organisations, not-for-profit organisations and industry groups to improve the standard of living in remote Territory communities.

This publication provides а snapshot of iobs and the characteristics of job holders in Wadeve as at June-July 2014. It contains information collected by the Northern Territory Department Business from businesses of operating within the town and is supplemented by other administrative data sets and information. This 2014 publication also compares and comments on variations that are evidenced between the 2014 and earlier 2011 collection periods.

The information collected and reported on represents a significant goodwill investment by those businesses that participated. Each business is listed at the end of this publication.




Publication Summary

At the time of collection in 2014 in Wadeye there were a total of 457 filled and vacant jobs, an increase of 5 jobs overall from 2011. Filled jobs increased by 2 to 426 jobs.

Of the 426 filled jobs there were:

 229 jobs held by Indigenous persons, a decrease of 27 jobs from 2011, and 197 jobs were held by non-Indigenous persons, an increase of 29 jobs from 2011

Summary Chart 1: Count of filled jobs in Wadeye by Indigenous status, 2011 and 2014




- 111 jobs in the public sector, a decrease of 4 jobs from 2011, and 315 jobs in the private sector, an increase of 6 jobs over the same period
- 178 permanent jobs, a decrease of 165 jobs from 2011, and 248 temporary jobs, an increase of 167 jobs from 2011, largely due to a large number of permanent jobs switching to temporary jobs at Our Lady of the Sacred Heart Thamarrurr Catholic School
- 218 jobs filled by males, an increase of 46 jobs from 2011, and 208 jobs filled by females, an increase of 83 jobs over the same period
- 19 jobs filled by persons aged 15-24 years, a decrease of 13 jobs from 2011, 241 jobs filled by persons aged 25-44 years, an increase of 93 jobs from 2011, and 166 jobs filled by persons aged 45+ years, an increase of 49 jobs from 2011
- 159 jobs as Community and personal service workers, making it the largest occupation group in terms of filled jobs
 - o other significant occupation groups were:
 - Professionals with 107 filled jobs
 - Labourers with 52 filled jobs
- there were 31 vacancies, an increase of 3 vacancies from 2011.


Chart 1: Count of vacant jobs and filled jobs by full-time/part-time status, 2011 and 2014 (a)(b)

 - o 229 jobs were filled by Indigenous persons, a decrease of 27 jobs from 2011
 - o 197 jobs were filled by non-Indigenous persons, an increase of 29 jobs from 2011
- Indigenous persons accounted for 54% of job holders compared to 60% in 2011.







Chart 3: Count of filled jobs by full-time/part-time status and Indigenous status of person in job, 2011 and 2014 (a)(b)(c)

 - o 107 were part-time jobs filled by Indigenous persons, an increase of 28 jobs from 2011
 - $\circ~$ 175 were full-time jobs filled by non-Indigenous persons, an increase of 14 jobs from 2011
 - $\circ\,$ 22 were part-time jobs filled by non-Indigenous persons, an increase of 15 jobs from 2011.





Chart 4: Count of filled jobs by sector of business, 2011 and 2014 (a)(d)

- there were 315 jobs in the private sector in 2014, an increase of 6 jobs from 2011.


Chart 5: Count of filled jobs by sector and Indigenous status of person in job, 2011 and 2014 (a)(c)(d)

 - o 46 were full-time jobs, a decrease of 7 jobs from 2011
 - o 13 were part-time jobs, a decrease of 12 jobs from 2011
- of the 170 jobs in the private sector filled by Indigenous persons:
 - o 76 were full-time jobs, a decrease of 48 jobs from 2011
 - o 94 were part-time jobs, an increase of 40 jobs from 2011
- of the 52 jobs in the public sector filled by non-Indigenous persons:
 - o 45 were full-time jobs, an increase of 13 jobs from 2011
 - $\circ~$ 7 were part-time jobs, an increase of 2 jobs from 2011



- there were 178 permanent jobs, a decrease of 165 jobs from 2011, of which:
 - \circ 97 jobs were filled by Indigenous persons, a decrease of 101 jobs from 2011
 - \circ 81 jobs were filled by non-Indigenous persons, a decrease of 64 jobs from 2011
- there were 248 temporary jobs, an increase of 167 jobs from 2011, of which:
 - o 132 jobs were filled by Indigenous persons, an increase of 74 jobs from 2011
 - o 116 jobs were filled by non-Indigenous persons, an increase of 93 jobs from 2011.

 - $\circ~$ 42 jobs were permanent, a decrease of 60 jobs from 2011, of which:
 - 18 jobs were filled by Indigenous persons, a decrease of 53 jobs from 2011
 - 24 jobs were filled by non-Indigenous persons, a decrease of 7 jobs from 2011
 - o 69 jobs were temporary, an increase of 56 jobs from 2011, of which:
 - 41 jobs were filled by Indigenous persons, an increase of 34 jobs from 2011
 - 28 jobs were filled by non-Indigenous persons, an increase of 22 jobs from 2011
- of the 315 jobs in the private sector in 2014:
 - o 136 jobs were permanent, a decrease of 105 jobs from 2011, of which:


- the Education and training industry was the largest industry employer, with 170 filled jobs or 39.9% of filled jobs, an increase of 39 jobs from 2011
- other significant industry employers were:
 - Public administration and safety with 132 jobs (or 31% of filled jobs), a decrease of 54 jobs from 2011
 - Health care and social assistance with 68 jobs (or 16% of filled jobs), an increase of 27 jobs from 2011
 - Retail trade with 33 jobs (or 7.7% of filled jobs), a decrease of 9 jobs from 2011.

 - $\circ~$ 96 jobs in Education and training, an increase of 8 jobs from 2011
 - \circ 78 jobs in Public administration and safety, a decrease of 36 jobs from 2011
 - o 34 jobs in Health care and social assistance, an increase of 6 jobs from 2011
- there were 197 jobs filled by non-Indigenous persons, including:
 - o 74 jobs in Education and training, an increase of 31 jobs from 2011
 - $\circ~$ 54 jobs in Public administration and safety, a decrease of 18 jobs from 2011
 - o 34 jobs in Health care and social assistance, an increase of 21 jobs from 2011.




Chart 9: Count of filled jobs by occupation, 2011 and 2014 (a)(f)(g)







These estimated Indigenous population data cover the community and associated outstations.
