




Bird's nest come in all shapes and sizes. Look out for these nests as you explore the bush.




A suspended cup of grass, bark and spider web.




A bowl of grass covered by mud.

A tree hollow.








HOME SWEET HOME

Fairy Martins collect balls of mud to build bottle-shaped nests on rock walls and under the eaves of buildings. To make them nice and cosy, they line them with fine grasses and feathers. They tend to nest in colonies of a few up to dozens and the walls of each nest will often be joined together.

Other small birds and even little bats often make the most of the Fairy Martins' hard work and use the old abandoned nests for themselves.


