## Nature Shift As night falls across the Territory, the nocturnal owls emerge from


As night falls across the Territory, the nocturnal owls emerge from their daytime hiding places among thick foliage or in tree hollows. These silent fliers spend the night hunting in clearings or by roadsides.

The **Southern Boobook** is a small owl found throughout the Territory. It has a distinctive call which sounds like *boo-book* or *more-pork*. It mainly eats insects such as moths.

The larger **Barking Owl** lives in the eucalypt woodlands of the Top End. Its dog-like wook-wook call is heard at dusk and dawn. It feeds on small birds, mice and insects.

The Barn Owl has an unusual white face which is heart-shaped. It has excellent hearing and can capture a mouse in a totally dark room. It is found throughout the Territory, but prefers open areas rather than dense forest.

## Annoying Honeyeaters

Owls are often mobbed by noisy honeyeaters as they try to catch some sleep during the daytime. They roost among thick foliage high in a tree. The honeyeaters annoy them until they get fed up and slip away to find another hiding place.






I have beautiful brown wings and am a bird of wetland areas. During the day I roost in trees. At night I feed on small fish, frogs, shellfish and insects.


The **Spotted Nightjar** spends the daytime roosting on the


ground, often out in the open.
