The data in this publication were predominantly collected by conducting a face-to-face survey of businesses within town boundaries during mid-2014. The collection methodology was created in accordance with Australian Bureau of Statistics data quality framework principles. Data in this publication are only reflective of those businesses reported on as operating in the town at the time of data collection (see Table 30 for list of businesses reported on).

To comply with privacy legislation or where appropriate, some data in this publication may have been adjusted and will not reflect the actual data reported by businesses. As a result of this, combined with certain data not being reported by some businesses, some components may not add to totals and changes over time may be partially reflective of business' change in propensity to report on certain data items rather than actual changes over time. Total figures have generally not been adjusted.

Caution is advised when interpreting the comparisons made to the earlier 2011 publication as the businesses identified and reported on and the corresponding jobs may differ between publications.

Notes for each table and chart are alphabetically ordered and listed at the end of the publication.

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This profile is intended to be used as an evidence base to inform decision making relating to workforce development and enterprise opportunity in this town. This is the second production and publication of the jobs profiles, the first was provided in 2011 to support the implementation of the National Partnership Agreement on Remote Service Delivery.

Angurugu

Angurugu is located on Groote Eylandt approximately 640 kilometres east-south-east of Darwin and a half hour flight south of Gove.

The Northern Territory Government is Territorians, working with the Australian Government, regional councils. land councils. private businesses. Aboriginal organisations, not-for-profit organisations industry groups to improve the standard of living in remote Territory communities.

This publication provides a snapshot of jobs and the characteristics of job holders in Angurugu as at June-July 2014. It contains information collected by the Northern Territory Department of Business from businesses operating within the town and is supplemented by other administrative data sets and information. This 2014 publication also compares comments on variations that are evidenced between the 2014 and earlier 2011 collection periods.

The information collected and reported on represents a significant goodwill investment by those businesses that participated. Each business is listed at the end of this publication.




Publication Summary

At the time of collection in 2014 in Angurugu there were a total of 186 filled and vacant jobs, a decrease of 33 jobs overall from 2011. Filled jobs decreased by 46 to 154 jobs.

Of the 154 filled jobs there were:

 94 jobs filled by Indigenous persons, a decrease of 31 jobs from 2011, and 60 jobs filled by non-Indigenous persons, a decrease of 15 jobs from 2011

Summary Chart 1: Count of filled jobs in Angurugu by Indigenous status, 2011 and 2014



- 83 jobs in the public sector, a decrease of 27 jobs from 2011, and 71 jobs in the private sector, a decrease of 19 jobs over the same period
- 85 permanent jobs, an increase of 11 jobs from 2011, and 69 temporary jobs, a decrease of 57 jobs from 2011
- 61 jobs filled by males, a decrease of 40 jobs from 2011, and 93 jobs filled by females, a decrease of 6 jobs over the same period
- 2 jobs filled by persons aged 15-24 years, a decrease of 1 job from 2011, 108 jobs filled by persons aged 25-44 years, an increase of 15 job from 2011, and 44 jobs filled by persons aged 45+ years, a decrease of 60 jobs from 2011
- 40 jobs as Clerical and administrative workers, making it the largest occupation group in terms of filled jobs
- other significant occupation groups were:
 - o Professionals with 36 filled jobs
 - o Technicians and trade workers with 27 filled jobs
- there were 32 job vacancies, an increase of 13 vacancies from 2011.

In 2011, GEBIE Civil and Construction Pty Ltd was a major business operating in Angurugu, but did not participate in the survey in 2014.



Chart 1: Count of vacant jobs and filled jobs by full-time/part-time status, 2011 and 2014 (a)(b)



- there were a total of 154 filled jobs, a decrease of 46 jobs from 2011
- of the 154 filled jobs in 2014:
 - o 120 were full-time jobs, a decrease of 48 jobs from 2011
 - o 34 were part-time jobs, an increase of 2 jobs from 2011
- there were 32 total job vacancies in 2014, an increase of 13 vacancies from 2011.

In 2014 in Angurugu:

- of the 154 filled jobs:
 - o 94 jobs were filled by Indigenous persons, a decrease of 31 jobs from 2011
 - o 60 jobs were filled by non-Indigenous persons, a decrease of 15 jobs from 2011
- Indigenous persons accounted for 61% of job holders compared to 63% in 2011.





Chart 3: Count of filled jobs by full-time/part-time status and Indigenous status of person in job, 2011 and 2014 (a)(b)(c)





Chart 4: Count of filled jobs by sector of business, 2011 and 2014 (a)(d)

- there were 71 jobs in the private sector in 2014, a decrease of 19 jobs from 2011.


Chart 5: Count of filled jobs by sector and Indigenous status of person in job, 2011 and 2014 (a)(c)(d)

Chart 7: Count of filled jobs by employment status and Indigenous status of person in job, 2011 and 2014 (a)(c)(e)





- the Public administration and safety industry was the largest industry employer, with 41 filled jobs or 26.6% of filled jobs, a decrease of 7 jobs from 2011
- other significant industry employers were:
 - Education and training with 33 jobs (or 21.4% of filled jobs), a decrease of 20 jobs from 2011
 - Agriculture, forestry and fishing with 31 jobs (or 20.1% of filled jobs), an increase of 31 jobs from 2011
 - Health care and social assistance with 18 jobs (or 11.7% of filled jobs), an increase of 6 jobs from 2011.



- Community and personal service workers was the largest occupation classification in terms of filled jobs, accounting for 40 jobs (26% of total filled jobs), a decrease of 13 jobs from 2011
- other significant occupation classifications were:
 - o Professionals (36 jobs or 23.4%) an increase of 2 jobs from 2011
 - o Technicians and trades workers (27 jobs or 17.5%) a decrease of 28 jobs from 2011
 - o Clerical and administrative workers (19 jobs or 12.3%) a decrease of 2 jobs from 2011.








